# Westlake Bicentennial 1811 – 2011

## City of Westlake Celebrates Bicentennial in 2011

To commemorate Westlake's Bicentennial, a yearlong series of events are taking place in our city. Members of community organizations, church and civic groups have joined with students, citizens, and local businesses to make this celebration special. Several events have already taken place with many more to come. Take a look at our celebration so far...

### Bicentennial Ball Drop

The city began the New Year with a Bicentennial ball drop at Crocker Park. The celebration was planned in conjunction with the city's sister city of Tralee, Ireland and was broadcast simultaneously in both cities. Both Mayors gave New Year's greetings via a large video screen viewed by attendees. The event began early which allowed families to join in the celebration and featured Irish dancers, bands, and fireworks. A large lighted ball, replicating the ball dropped on Times Square, was constructed by the city's Service Department and dropped at 7:00 P.M. (midnight in Ireland).



### Saint Patrick's Day Parade

With the help of the Westlake Service department and Sign Shop staff, the city entered a float in Cleveland's annual Saint Patrick's Day parade. Original discussion for the float was started by the Irish American Club. The float was inspired by the Bicentennial and our partnership with our sister city of Tralee. A refurbished trailer was pulled by the city's Police Department D.A.R.E. van. The city's "Rose of Tralee" candidates (see below) were driven in a car that followed the float.



### Bridging Across Generations Art Show

The fourth annual "Bridging Across Generations" art show was tied this year to the city's Bicentennial celebration. Featuring the art work of students from kindergarten through grade twelve, the juried show was displayed at City Hall from April 19<sup>th</sup> to the 21<sup>st</sup> with an Artist's Reception on opening night. The art show was in conjunction with the city's sister city of Tralee. With the help of the Westlake Arts Council, the art was later shipped to Ireland to be displayed. The art projects will return to Westlake later this year with an art exhibit from the students of Tralee.



### Rose of Tralee

On May 6<sup>th</sup>, the Northern Ohio Rose of Tralee celebration was held at Crocker Park. The Rose of Tralee is a tradition that started over fifty years ago in Tralee, Ireland. Rose of Tralee Centers can be found in Irish communities across the globe. Each center selects a rose, who in turn represents their region for an entire year. The young women then compete in Ireland for the chance to be selected the International Rose of Tralee. This year, five local candidates competed for the regional title. Selection is based on character and celebration of Irish ancestry and the winner, Bridget Linton, went on to compete at the finals.



### Dedication at Bradley Nature Park for Girl Scout Bronze Award

Girl Scout Troop 71047 worked with the City of Westlake, the Service Department and the Sign Shop staff to create a sign that is now a permanent fixture at the Bradley Road Nature Park. The sign that was erected depicts animals, insects, birds and reptiles that are frequently seen upon visiting the park. The troop did all the research and compiled the data into the format to be placed on the sign. Comprised of six panels, one panel provides information about the troop and their award

winning project, another tells the history of the park and land origins, and the remaining four panels present wildlife pictures and information. Mayor Dennis Clough presented the troop with an official proclamation on May 15<sup>th</sup>, declaring the day as Troop 71047 Day in Westlake in honor of their Bronze Award project.



### Seniors Cruisin' Through Time

To honor the valuable roles that older adults have played throughout Westlake's 200-year history, a special event called "Seniors Cruisin' Through Time" was organized. Created and sponsored by ten Westlake residential centers, the luncheon was attended by 400 guests at La Centre Banquet facility on May 17<sup>th</sup>. Local weather personality Eileen McShea hosted the ceremonies and activity stations featured Ohio wines, a roulette wheel, a mini-spa, cupcake decorating, and salsa dancing. A DJ provided tunes and the entertainment featured Dean Martin and Sammy Davis impersonators and a visit from founding resident Leonard G. Porter. A fun time was had by all!



### Bicentennial Bookmarks

The City's Planning and Economic Development Department has been publishing a series of bookmarks to commemorate the founding families of Westlake. Each bookmark provides a brief biography of each family with pictures of the homes they built. Each bookmark also notes an upcoming Bicentennial event to be held within the city. Twelve bookmarks are planned in all. The bookmarks are available at Porter Public Library.



### Events to Come

#### Founder's Trail Dedication

As part of the Bicentennial celebration and in an effort to preserve our history, the city's founding families will be honored with a Founder's Walk at Clague Park. The city purchased bricks from the recently demolished Red Brick School on Dover Center Road to be used for the walkway. Engraved bricks that will be placed alongside the founder's bricks may be purchased through July 18<sup>th</sup> from the Westlake Kiwanis, Westlake Historical Society or through the city. The walk is scheduled to be completed sometime in September with a dedication date to be announced.

#### Mayor Clough's Culinary Bicentennial Grand Finale

On Saturday, November 12<sup>th</sup>, Mayor Clough will hold a Culinary Bicentennial Grand Finale at La Centre. Over twenty-five area restaurants will feature menu items for guests to dine on. Kenny Crumpton from Fox8 News will emcee the event with entertainment, dancing, and Bicentennial events planned. Ticket information will be forthcoming.

#### Time Capsule

The Westlake Historical Society is assisting with the construction of a Bicentennial Time Capsule. The time capsule is the Eagle Scout project of Evan Keleman. The capsule will be built to withstand 100 years with a prototype to be unveiled soon. It will be buried at Evergreen Cemetery with a closing ceremony to commemorate the sealing of the capsule. Items to be included in the capsule will be documents pertaining to the history of Dover/Westlake as well as items that represent everyday life here in Westlake. The Society is asking the community to offer their suggestions for items to be included in boxes that will be located throughout Westlake. Suggestions may also be submitted via the Westlake Historical Society website or the Westlake Bicentennial Facebook page.

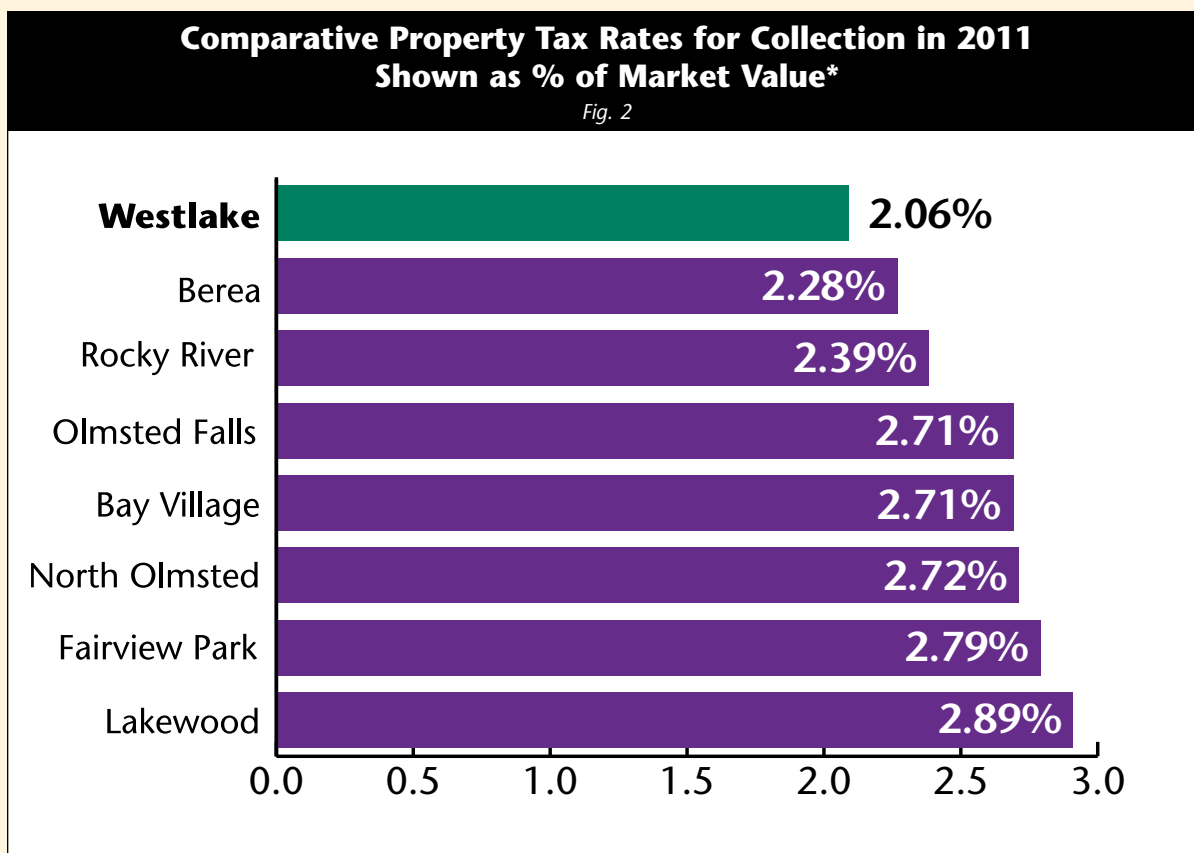
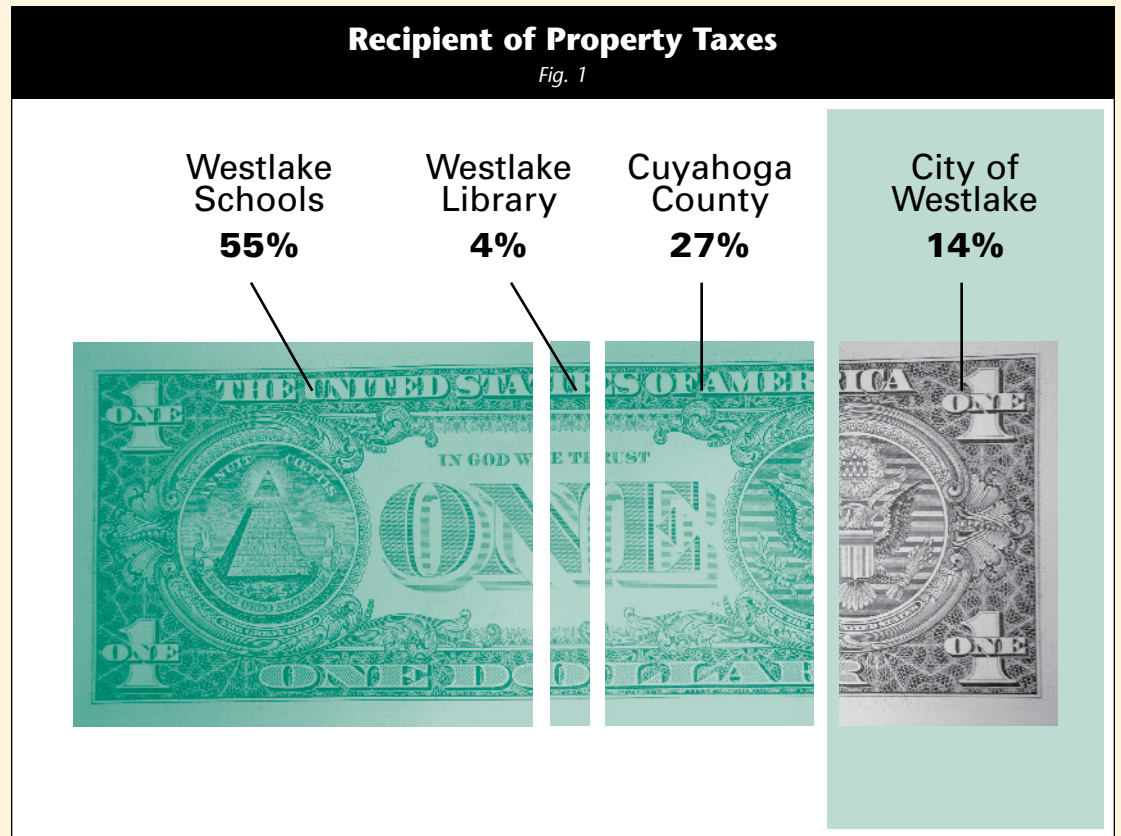
# Financial Review

## Understanding Property Taxes

A fundamental difference between the City of Westlake and the Westlake School District is the main funding source used by each entity for operating purposes. The City of Westlake primarily relies on income tax revenues which total approximately 41 percent of the city's annual sources of income. The Westlake School District is mostly funded by taxes paid on property that falls within its district.

Property tax in Westlake, administered by Cuyahoga County, is based on the county-assigned value of all parcels of land within each taxing district. The Cuyahoga County Auditor determines an assessed value which is 35 percent of the appraised market value for each parcel. This value is updated every three years based on the average price that surrounding or similar properties sold for within the previous three-year period. Every six years, the Auditor revisits all properties to re-appraise the value of each piece of land based on any building additions or major improvements. The last comprehensive re-appraisal of property values occurred during 2009.

For tax collection year 2011, a homeowner in Westlake will pay 2.06 percent of market or appraised value of their home in property taxes (see Figure 2).



## Explanation of Cuyahoga County Property Tax Rates

### Tax as a Percentage of Market:

A simple percentage used to estimate total property taxes for a property. Multiply the market value of the property by the percentage listed for your taxing district.

### Example:

Taxes for a \$100,000 home in Westlake:  
 $\$100,000 \times 2.059\% = \$2,059$  annual property tax bill

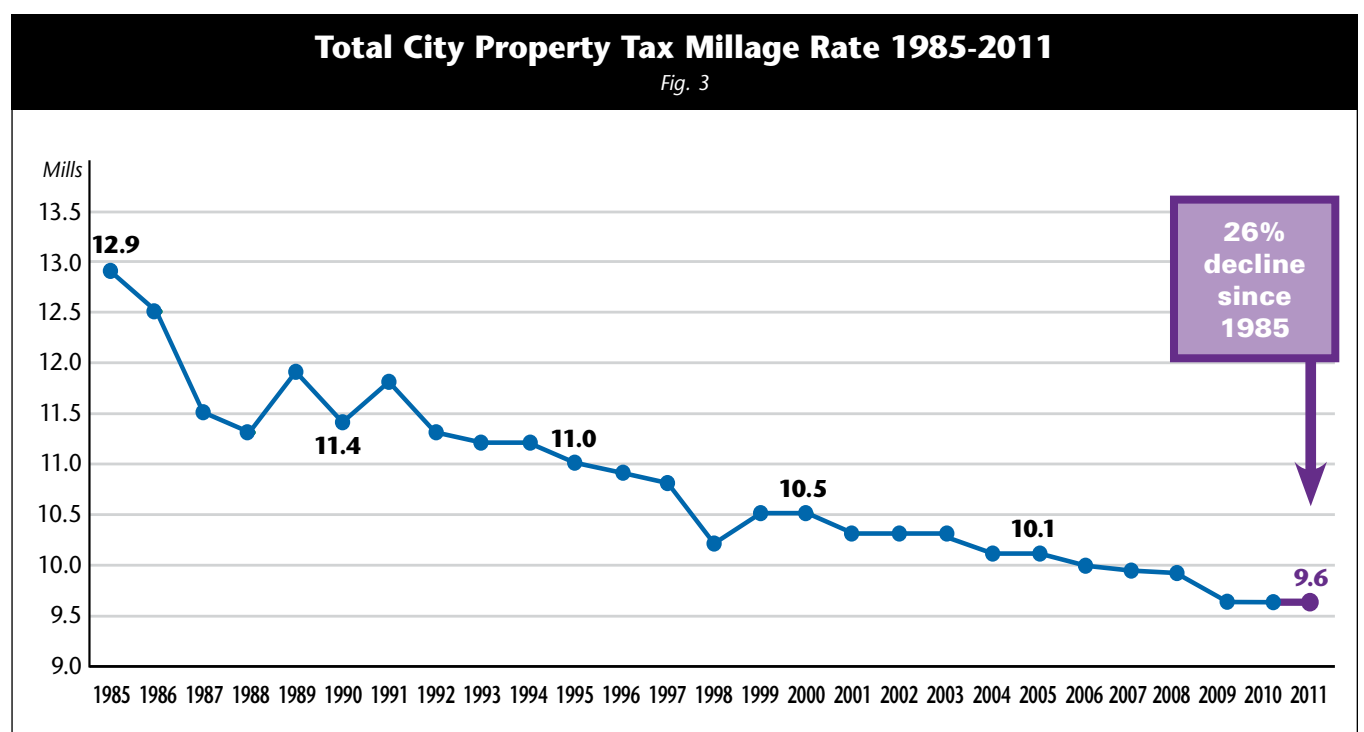
## Westlake's City Property Tax Rate

The City of Westlake has been widely recognized by several financial rating agencies, including Moody's Investors Service, Standard & Poor's and Fitch Ratings, for its excellence in financial management. One area that has been commended is the city's ability to keep its tax rates low as compared to other cities, while providing high quality services.

The city has been able to achieve low tax rates through long term financial planning and conservative fiscal management. The city annually reviews its revenue projections and requirements for the upcoming year, and adjusts the tax rate to correlate with the needs of the projected expenditures.

Since 1985, the city of Westlake has reduced the property tax rate to Westlake residents by over 26 percent (see Figure 3). The adjacent chart provides a history of the city's portion of the property tax.

# Financial Review

The following is an overview of the city's financial operations for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2010. The data included in this review is not prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) as only a portion of the city's financial statements are presented. Most of the data is, however, compiled from the city's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR). The city's audited financial statements are generally completed approximately six months after the end of the fiscal year, with the official audit report completed soon thereafter.

For simplicity purposes, the tables are compiled using the fund financial statements for Governmental Funds (the funds through which most government functions are financed, such as the general fund, special revenue funds, debt service funds, and capital funds).

## Where the Money Comes From...

### Revenues

Major sources of revenue for the city include income tax, property tax and state shared taxes (see Figure 4). Total revenues for fiscal year 2010 were \$46,569,850. As a percentage of total revenue, income tax accounted for 41 percent. Property tax combined with state shared taxes equals 44 percent. The decrease in property tax receipts can be attributed mainly to the national decline in home values. Income tax collections rose 4.8 percent, a sign of economic recovery. The largest decline was in interest revenue, solely due to falling interest rates.

## Where the Money Goes...

### Expenditures

Expenditures for 2010 increased by \$11,916,435, primarily due to the renewal of a \$9.3 million note to finance two major infrastructure projects prior to the issuance of bonds. This resulted in a significant increase in debt service payments.

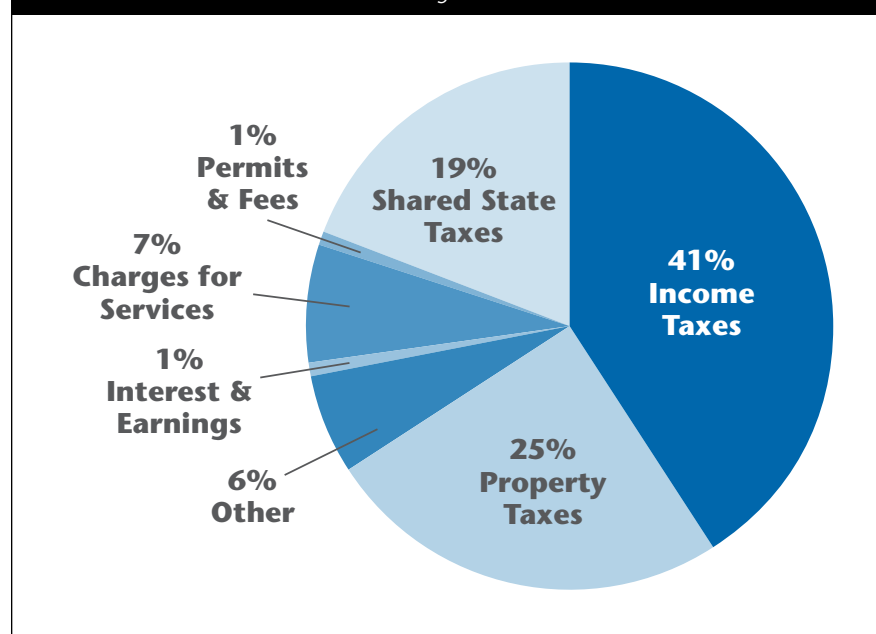
The largest expenditure category remains the security of persons and property, which includes all police and fire related activities. Capital outlay also increased due to significant improvements to infrastructure in 2010 such as the widening of Clague Road and the Hilliard Boulevard water main rehabilitation.

General government expenditures actually declined due to an adjustment to health care funding in 2009 and a decrease in legal costs in 2010.

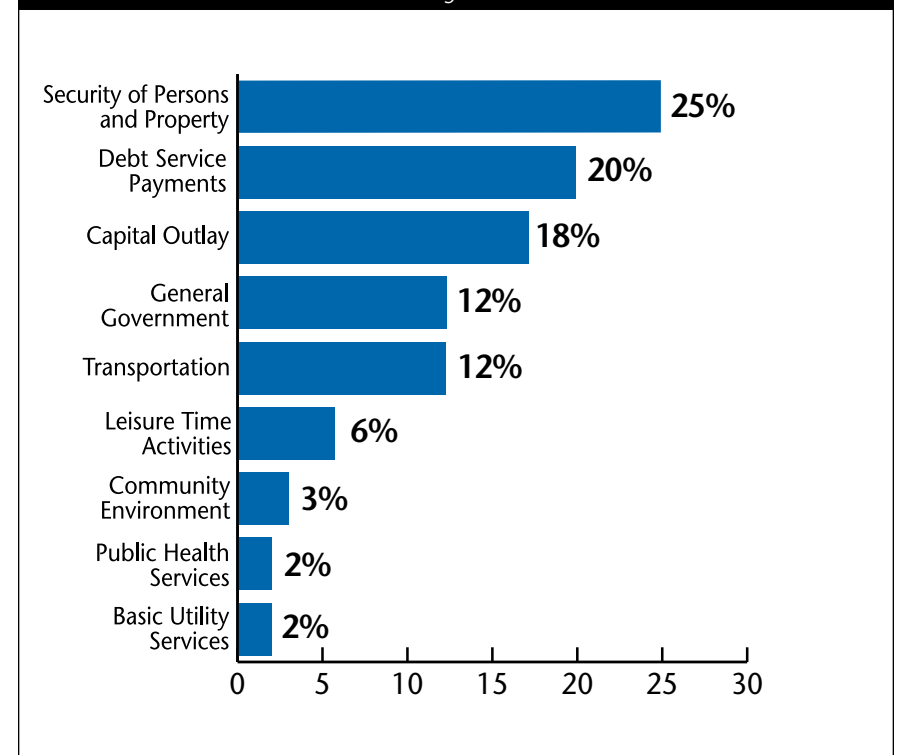
2010 Revenues by Source—All Activities

# 2011 Capital Projects in Progress

## Waterline and Roadway Rehabilitation

### Westwood and Clague Roads

The city is replacing the waterline along Westwood Road from Columbia Road to the Fairview Park Corporation limits and also on Clague Road from Center Ridge Road to the North Olmsted Corporation limits. New 8' and 12' waterlines will be installed. The project will also include new fire hydrants, improvements to roadway surface drainage, curb repairs and the replacement and resurfacing of the roadway. Fabrizi Trucking is doing the construction. The project began in May and should be completed by September of 2011. Estimated cost is \$3,591,000.



## Dover Center/Detroit Road Intersection Widening

The city has hired Great Lakes Crushing to widen Detroit Road from three to five lanes at Dover Center Road approximately 500 feet east and west of the intersection. Not only will the project improve the safety and capacity of the intersection, but emissions from idling vehicles will be reduced.



Various underground utilities will also be replaced. The project is being financed with 80% of the funds coming from the Ohio Department of Transportation Safety Fund and 20% from the city's Infrastructure Tax. Construction began in April of this year with a scheduled completion date in December of 2011. Estimated cost is \$2,296,000.

## Allen/Westhill Sanitary

United Survey has been hired to complete the Allen and Westhill Drives Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation project. The project is designed to reduce flooding and storm water infiltration into the sanitary sewer system. Storm and sanitary areas in need of rehabilitation were previously identified. This program is part of a city-wide plan to eliminate inflow and infiltration of storm water into the sanitary sewer system. Estimated cost is \$606,000.



## 2011 Concrete Rehabilitation with Asphalt Overlay

The city repairs various residential and industrial streets on an annual basis. Defective concrete is removed and replaced, drainage structures are repaired, and asphalt overlay is applied. This results in quieter and smoother driving conditions and extends the service life of the pavement. Burton Scot Corporation has been hired to complete this process in 2011. Estimated cost is \$2,599,000. The following streets and developments are scheduled for rehabilitation:

- Ohio Shores Subdivision-Concrete Repairs with Asphalt Overlay
- Quail Hollow/Pebblebrook Subdivision-Concrete Repairs with Asphalt Overlay
- Royal Forest Subdivision-Concrete Only
- Settlers Landing Subdivision #4-Concrete Only

## 2011 Crack and Joint Seal

Pavement Technologies will be applying crack seal to various roadways throughout the city. The sealant, applied to cracks within the pavement, prevents the mitigation of water into the pavement which causes damage during freeze cycles. The hot sealant has a material applied over it to prevent tracking onto cars and driveways. This allows the city to maintain the quality of our roads in a cost effective manner. Estimated cost is \$179,000. In 2011, the following streets will be included in this project:

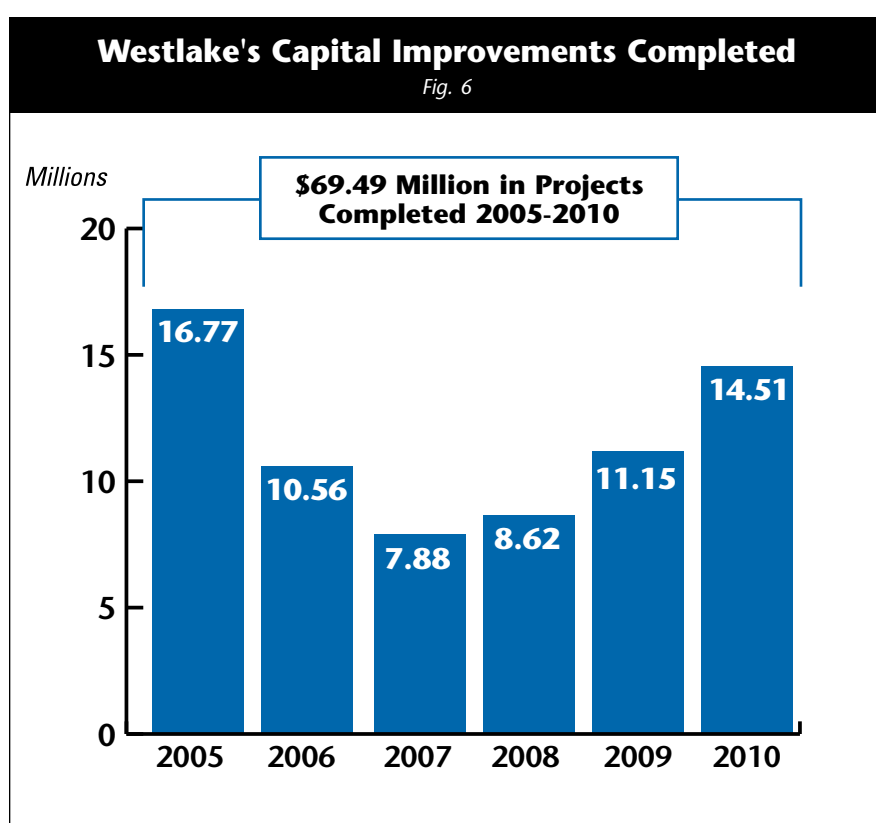
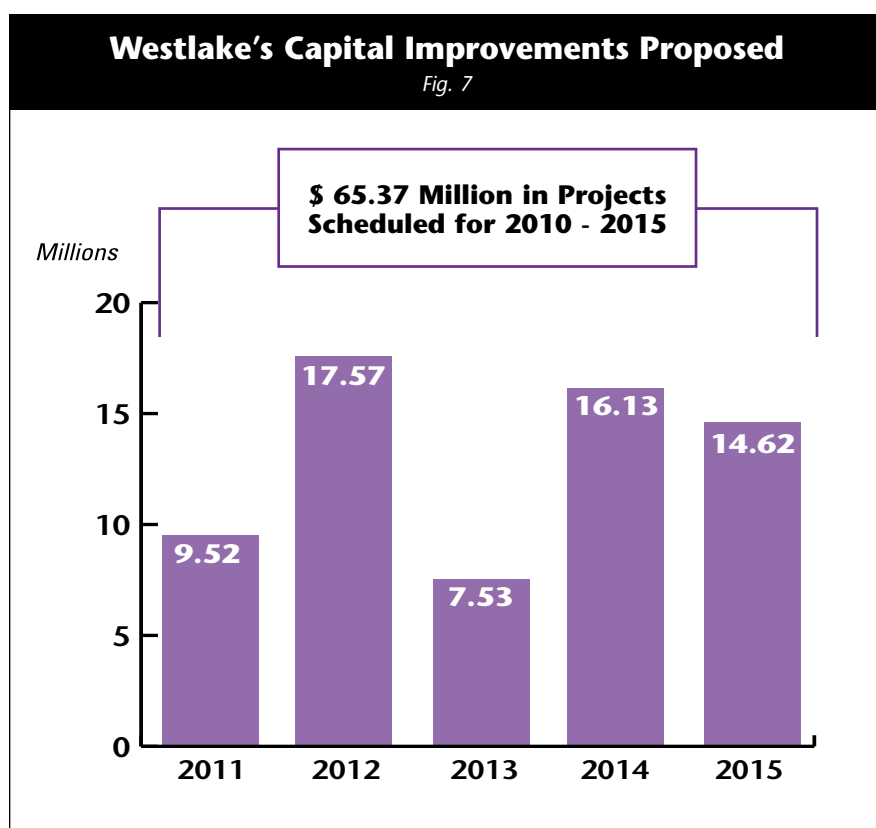
## Westlake's Capital Improvements Program

The 2011 projects and future year capital improvements will be paid from planned revenue sources which have been legally restricted and/or designated for these projects.

In 1993, and renewed in 2006, the residents of Westlake passed a 3/8 of 1 percent increase in the city income tax solely for the purpose of improving the infrastructure within the city such as: roads, sewers and waterlines. These income tax dollars can only be used for the authorized purpose approved by the residents of Westlake. The city collects these revenues and allocates them to the eligible projects identified in the tables below. The projects go through a rigorous series of planning, prioritizing and final review before making it into the Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan.

Some of the projects are partially funded through State or Federal grants, and timing may be changed depending on the funding sources' requirements.

# Police and Fire Levy Renewal

**Date of Renewal:** Tuesday, November 8, 2011

**Millage:** 0.9 Mill (**Renewal-No increase in tax rates**)

**Cost:** 90 cents for each \$1,000 of tax valuation or \$2.30 monthly for a home with a \$100,000 market value

**Amount:** Generates approximately \$1,200,000 annually

**Duration:** Five-Year Renewable Levy

**Purpose:** Restricted to Police and Fire salaries and other expenses

**Explanation:** The Police and Fire Levy generates \$1.2 million annually and is used to supplement approximately 10% of the overall operations of the Police and Fire Departments by paying for the salaries and other expenses of the two departments. This levy has been in effect since 1966 and will be on the November 2011 ballot again.
